# (a) Three current issues in application of assessment processes discussed in this session

- incomprehensible nature of the language used in IAs
- how to go about (expected) rewards for participation
- how to partner with the public; how to inform, involve, and create level playing field

- more transparent procedures

## (c) Issues relating to impact assessment effectiveness:

## (i) dimensions of IA effectiveness (i.e. what are the characteristics of effective IA?)

- participatory and valuing and using local knowledge

#### (ii) challenges/barriers to IA effectiveness

- language
- focus on either on environment (opponenets) or on economics (proponents); no integration

## (iii) how these barriers might be overcome

- partnering, field assessments, technical backup for public. Minimize political abuse

# (d) Comments on the Art and Science of Impact Assessment (i.e. the relative importance and interplay between science and values/politics/subjectivity in impact assessment)

Professionals and politicians seem to hinder public participation in impact assessment by creating own jargon, a lack of transparency and strategic behavior; good participation should overcome these barriers.
