Overview

- Bill C-69, introduced in February 2018, proposes to repeal the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, 2012 and replace it with the Impact Assessment Act
- Key features of the proposed Impact Assessment Act:
 - Impact Assessment Agency of Canada would conduct all assessments
 - Scope of assessments would expand to consider environmental, social, health and economic impacts
 - Mandatory consideration of Indigenous knowledge
 - Greater partnership and engagement with Indigenous peoples
 - Early, inclusive and meaningful public engagement
 - Decisions based on science and Indigenous knowledge
 - Regional and strategic assessments to support project assessments and remove broad policy debates from project assessments

Regulatory Tools

- Two key regulations would come into force with the legislation:
 - Regulations Designating Physical Activities (Project List):
 Describes physical activities that may require impact assessment under the Impact Assessment Act
 - o Information Requirements and Time Management Regulations: Identify information required from the proponent in their project description, which would inform the planning phase, and identify how legislated timelines will be managed
- Additional regulations will be developed in the next few years:
 - Cost Recovery Regulations
 - Indigenous Cooperation Regulations

Public Participation

Principles:

- Starts early, continues throughout
- Supported with funding
- Inclusive and transparent
- Increases knowledge of participants and government
- Prioritizes participation by those most affected
- Flexible methods to meet needs of participants
- Influences decision-making in ways participants can see
- Adapts and improves continually

Tools:

To **share information** with public:

- Social media and advertising
- Open houses
- Renewed online tools (Impact Assessment Registry of Canada)

To **gather information** from public:

- Workshops, technical meetings or focus groups
- Informal meetings in potentially affected communities
- Renewed online tools (Impact Assessment Registry of Canada)

Indigenous Peoples

- Cooperation and collaboration approaches
 - Cooperation arrangements with Indigenous governing bodies developed in collaboration with Indigenous peoples
- Assessment of Impacts on Indigenous Rights
 - Respect for Indigenous rights entrenched in the Act
 - Mandatory consideration of adverse impacts on Indigenous rights at key decision points
- Capacity Support Program
 - Build capacity of Indigenous groups to participate in assessments
- Engagement with Indigenous Peoples to develop tools
 - Workshops with Indigenous bodies with expertise
 - Consultation with rights holders on draft guidance
 - Build on lessons learned from previous project consultations
 - Indigenous Advisory Committee

Next Steps

- Bill C-69 is currently being reviewed by the Senate
 - If amended by the Senate, the Bill would return to the House of Commons for consideration of the amendments
- Following Royal Assent, the new Impact Assessment Act would come into force on a date to be established by Order in Council
- Project List regulations and Information Requirements and Timeline Management regulations would be timed to come into force with the legislation
