Consensus with nations....

- Is a core feature of the legislation;
- Is a cooperative process;
- Informs the decisions of both provincial and Indigenous governments;
- Allows for the indication of the support or not for a decision; and
- Does not limit a nation to ultimately indicate their consent or not for a project.

Recommendations - proponents





Learnings - regulators

Listen closely to nations

Determine issues early and seek resolution

Prepare participants and proponents well

Avoid acronyms and other jargon, use plain language

Avoid surprises

Provide clear workplans, guidance and expectations
